Greetings and salutations to all AAHN members and conference participants and welcome to Milwaukee!

It is my pleasure to welcome all of you to the annual conference. The AAHN conferences have a well-deserved reputation for stellar scholarship, valuable networking opportunities, and an enjoyable time to mingle among members with a shared interest. This year's conference will be no exception.

Once again, we have a varied and engaging number of sessions beginning with the preconference session, *HIT RECORD: A pre-conference session on oral history interviewing.* This session will be led by three AAHN experts in the oral history methodology: Karen Flynn, PhD- Director of the Midwest Nursing History Center at the University of Illinois Chicago, Ashley Graham Perel, EdD, RN – Assistant Professor of Nursing at Columbia University School of Nursing, and Andre Rosario, PhD, RN – Postdoctoral Fellow at Rutgers University. Also on Thursday, the Director of the University of Wisconsin Center for Nursing History, Laurie Glass, PHD, RN, and longtime AAHN member will be holding an open house from 3-6pm. The center is three miles from the hotel, and I urge those of you who will be arriving on Thursday and have the time to have a look.

We are fortunate to have noted historian Cynthia Connelly, PHD, RN to deliver our Eleanor Hermann keynote address. Dr. Connelly is a Professor of Nursing at the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing and holds the Rosemarie B. Greco Endowed Term Chair in Advocacy. At Penn, she is also Co-Faculty Director at the Field Center for Children's Policy, Practice, and Research. She received her BSN from the University of Pennsylvania, MSN from the University of Rochester, and PhD from the University of Pennsylvania. She also completed a postdoctoral fellowship at the Center for the History and Ethics of Public Health at Columbia University's Mailman School of Public Health and a legislative fellowship in the office of Paul Wellstone in the US Senate. Connolly's research analyzes the historical forces that have shaped children's health care delivery and family policy in the United States. Her body of work also traces changing pediatric medical and nursing practice in the United States since the Civil War with an emphasis on shifting norms for clinical practice, including evolving diagnostic categories, clinical assessment and treatment.



No conference can ever take place without the assistance of many people. First, I would like to extend special thanks to Michelle Heyman- Chair of the Abstract committee. Dr. Heyman spearheaded the onerous task of moving the organization's abstract submission and evaluation process to the online platform Oxford Abstracts. Additionally, she revised the scoring rubrics to better reflect the abstract submissions- research, education, and panel submissions. Her persistence and time devoted to this enabled the organization to move into what is the industry standard for such submissions. Kudos Michelle!



- We will be introducing a topical section each year. The section for 2025 is 'Nursing History in the Curriculum'
- Finally, we will be re-introducing sections for methodological papers and Keynote talks as appropriate

Eleanor Hermann Keynote Nurses and Drug Therapy: A Complicated and Untold Twentieth Century History Dr. Cindy Connolly

Synopsis

Medication (Drug) therapy is considered central to the expertise of registered nurses. Learning about medications and how to administer them via different routes is a core task of undergraduate nursing education. Staff nurses in hospital settings spend a great deal of their time preparing, administering, and assessing the effects of medications. But very little of the historical research into the history of drug therapy in the United States even mentions nurses. There is little in the nursing historical literature as well. This talk aims to address this gap by examining the role of nurses in drug development, testing, and administration across the twentieth century.

Speaker Bio

Historian and pediatric nurse practitioner Cynthia Connolly PhD RN is the Rosemarie B. Greco Term Endowed Professor in Advocacy at the University of Pennsylvania School of Nursing. At Penn, she is also Co-Faculty Director at the Field Center for Children's Policy, Practice, and Research. She received her BSN from the University of Pennsylvania, MSN from the University of Rochester, and PhD from the University of Pennsylvania. Research Awards

Teresa E. Christy Award for Exemplary Historical Research and Writing

The purpose of the Teresa E. Christy Award is to encourage new nursing history investigators, and to recognize excellence of historical research and writing done while the researcher was in a student status. The Christy Award is given for doctoral work; the submissions are usually dissertations.

Lavinia L. Dock Award for Exemplary Historical Research and Writing

The purpose of the Lavinia L. Dock Award is to recognize outstanding research and writing produced by an experienced scholar in nursing history who submits a book.

Award Winner

Jane Brooks - Jewish Refugees and the British Nursing Profession

Mary Adelaide Nutting Award

The purpose of the Mary Adelaide Nutting Award is to recognize outstanding research and writing produced by an experienced scholar or student in nursing history who submits, most often, a post-doctoral research manuscript or article. Articles by pre-doctoral students should be submitted to the Christy Award.

Research Grants

H-15 - Early Career Research Grant

The H-15 Grant is awarded to early career scholars who hold a research doctorate and received their doctorate within the previous 8 years for proposals outlining a historical research study. The grant provides \$3,000 in funding.

Lydia Wytenbroek - Globalizing Nursing: Diplomatic Initiatives to Internationalize Nursing Science Aims

H-31 - Pre-doctoral Research Grant

This grant is designed to encourage and support graduate training and historical research at the Masters and research Doctoral levels. The grant will be \$2,000. Awardees will also be given one-year of free membership to the AAHN. Proposals will focus on a significant question in the history of nursing. Students applying for this grant must be enrolled in an accredited Masters or research Doctoral program and a member of the AAHN.
